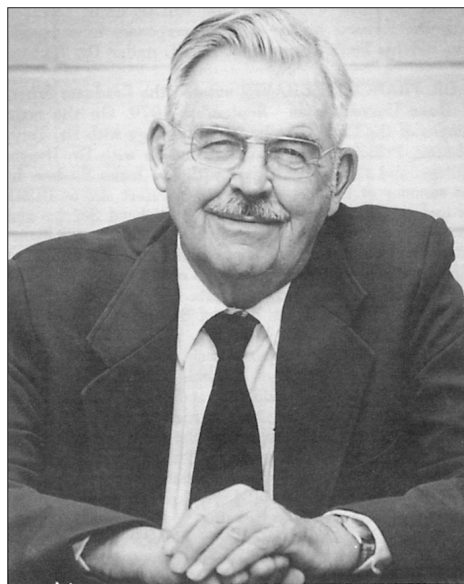


In Memoriam Professor Cazlyn Green Bookhout

On August 4, 2003, Professor Emeritus Cazlyn Green Bookhout died at 96 after a life dedicated to teaching, research, and to the improvement of the Duke University Marine Laboratory, Beaufort, NC, U.S.A. On receiving his Ph.D. from Duke University in 1934, he became a member of the Department of Zoology, teaching invertebrate zoology and related subjects at the University. During the periods 1939–1968 and 1971–1987 he offered advanced courses during the summer terms at the Marine Laboratory and served as the Director from 1950 to 1968. As Acting Director of the Cooperative Program in Biological Oceanography from 1961–1970, he supervised the launching of the RV 'Eastward' which provided for teaching and research opportunities for qualified scientists from universities and colleges throughout the United States. This program led to the development of the National Science Foundation 'University National Oceanographic Laboratory System.' Professor Bookhout's research focused on the development and distribution of crustacean larvae in estuarine and oceanic waters and the effects of pollutants on the larval stages. His work, frequently in collaboration with scientists from European and U.S. institutions, resulted in 63 publications in national and international journals. He was an active member of several U.S. scientific organizations and also participated in a number of annual meetings of the European Marine Biological Association. Throughout his scientific career, Professor Bookhout publicized the activities of the Beaufort laboratory at international scientific meetings, frequently spending his sabbaticals conducting research at worldwide marine facilities.

'Bookie', as he was affectionately known by his many friends throughout the international marine community, continued his dedication to the Duke

Marine Laboratory even into his 90's, serving as a member of the Advisory Board of the Laboratory. While remaining seriously focused on his scientific endeavors, visitors to the Laboratory will remember his humor and expertise on the croquet court.

Professor C.G. Bookhout will be remembered for his contributions to our understanding of crustacean development. 'Bookie' will be remembered for his consideration for students and visiting staff.

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
